Spiritual Sincerity

Matthew 21:28-32 - The Parable of the Two Sons

Dear Friends,

Mental checklists often occupy our minds during any "spare" minute of the day. Even though thinking about something won't get it done, our minds keep at it. Woe is me - how to determine the priorities against the wants and the requests?! One thousand years ago Bernard of Clairvaux coined a phrase that has come down to us as, "The road to hell is paved with *good intentions*".

Our mental checklists address our intentions, not our eventual actions. Clarvaux may well have had the parable of the two sons in mind. One son indicates an unwillingness to work. The other son responds favorably, perhaps telling his father what he wants to hear, but chooses not to act upon the intention. In the end, the 1st son reconsiders his response, changes his mind and acts upon his Father's request.

Ortberg titles the last chapter of our Fall Study, "Spiritual Sincerity". What does that have to do with the parable or our mental lists? Everything! Following Jesus requires confronting our do's and don'ts, our lists and responses, our intentions and actions, with a willingness to ask forgiveness for what we leave undone. This is what leads to a sincere heart and a transformed spirit.

Fall is here and with the cooler weather comes a change in menus. We will be changing our Hesed House menus from tacos to casseroles and warm veggies. Your help and dedication truly

helps those in desperate need, and we are truly blessed by all of your dedication. Here is an article recently posted by Hesed House.

According to the National Alliance to End Homelessness, approximately 32 percent of the 14,144 people who experience homelessness in Illinois suffer from a serious mental illness. While Illinois already cut \$113.7 million from mental health services between 2009 and 2012, the State's most recent proposed budget includes a \$1.5 billion reduction in Medicaid, the largest source of funding for mental health services in Illinois.

Hesed House faces substantial cuts under the proposed budget, but at the same time it will have stronger needs from the community for its services. The proposed service cuts will also impact the agencies that employ substance abuse and mental health counselors, and the Medicaid cuts will impact the services provided by Aunt Martha's (which is also housed at Hesed House's Comprehensive Resource Center), making it harder for our neighbors most in need to receive medical care.

While Hesed House continues to help "the least of these," we truly hope that our lawmakers in Springfield will join us by recognizing how devastating the proposed budget cuts would be to so many in Illinois.

The Hesed House is in also need of these items: Diapers- sizes 4,5 and 6, Travel Size Shampoo, Travel Size Toothpaste, Cold Medicine, Cough Drops, Tums, Towels, Wash Cloths, Deodorant, Foot Powder, Batteries (AA AAA & C) Twin fitted and flat sheets and Prayers. If you would like to donate these or any other items, please place them in the Hesed House donation box.

Both Sarah and Brian resided with their families of origin, which were not environments of consistent safety or emotional support. Sarah and Brian used the budgeting and workforce development curriculum presented at our Naperville group in order to improve their living situations. By applying the knowledge and skills they acquired through the group program, the family reached their personal goal of obtaining higher paying jobs and living independently.

Sarah and Brian are invested parents who utilized the resources presented in group to provide a stable and cohesive living environment for their son. Sarah and Brian's growth and success is just one example of Teen Parent Connection's powerful impact on support group participants.

What is the Great Banquet?

The Great Banquet is a spiritual retreat weekend with separate retreats for men and women. It is part of an International, ecumenical, Christian, lay led movement that began in Spain after World War 2. Now in many countries and with many titles, the retreats are similarly organized and include 3 days of unplugging; of 'stepping away' from our demanding lives for a time of worship, talks, shared meals, and fellowship. The original



title of this was Cursillo which means in Spanish, "short course" as in a short course in Christian life and faith. At the least, it is a great refresher and for some, it is a first.

Why is it called the Great Banquet?

Jesus tells the story of the Great Banquet in Luke 14:16-24 and it becomes a message for the weekend. The weekend is also meant to be a "banquet "in every way with wonderful conversation, new friendships, spiritual renewal, spectacular meals, study, laughter, reflection and especially - the opportunity to draw near to God with a whole lot less interruptions. It is a remarkable opportunity to experience Christian community in a quieter, smaller and more intimate setting; perhaps not so different from Jesus and His disciples. It is also amazing how Knox becomes the Knox Hilton for those days!
